From the Rector

Easter 2023: Christ Is Risen! Christ Is Risen Indeed!

Every year at this time, it is encouraging to experience warmer temperatures and see the signs of spring emerging all around us, even if they end up being buried under a few inches of snow again. But we know this snow will melt, shoots will appear in our flowerbeds, and soon we will be raking in our backyards once again.

Another sign of spring that brings many people joy and excitement is seeing hundreds of men who have played baseball all of their lives head off to Florida to practice the fundamentals of baseball. Day after day, for these six weeks, these men who get paid millions of dollars to play baseball, go back to the basics: hitting, fielding, running the bases – every phase of the game is studied all over again.

Now if you ask anybody at all, except for Barry Bonds, if they think spring training is a waste of time, they will assure you that they have not forgotten what to do. But rather they go so they'll get better at what baseball players do. It's a return to the basics to get them ready for the long season ahead so they'll be prepared and be able to give their best to what they've devoted their lives to doing.

Here in the church as spring approaches, we have been on our Lenten journey again. Not because we are novices and must be taught the basics for the first time; but because whoever we are, and wherever we are on our journey of faith, these are the basics that will sustain us for the long season ahead. These are the same fundamentals that we rehearse year after year, for they are what make us strong and prepared for whatever curve ball we may experience in the days to come.

As well during this time, we have been busy preparing to celebrate the new life and new hope that the Risen Christ brings. Our Holy Week services begin on Palm Sunday, April 2nd when we celebrate Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem with a procession of palm branches with services at 8:30 am and 10:30 am.

Then on Maundy Thursday, April 6th, we'll gather at 7:00 pm to remember the last supper and Jesus' mandate (mandatum became maundy) to "love one another as I have loved you." After celebrating the Eucharist, our liturgy will include stripping the altar of all furnishings to remind us of how the soldiers stripped Christ of his garments prior to his crucifixion.

We then gather on Good Friday, April 7th, at 10:30 am, to hear the proclamation of Christ's Passion and reflect upon his sacrifice for us. The tone is solemn, but not somber, for our emphasis is on the victory of the cross.

On Saturday, April 8th, we will celebrate the Great Vigil of Easter beginning at 8:30 pm. The Vigil is the night we gather in darkness, acknowledging our need for the light of Christ. We then kindle a fire, light the Paschal candle, and process into a darkened church. As a pillar of fire led the Israelites at night, so Christ the light of the world leads us. We will then mark the beginning of the fifty days of Easter on Sunday April 9th at 8:30 am and 10:30 am.

Holy Week provides an opportunity for us to encounter our most powerful and transformative liturgies. They are central to our faith and our walk with Christ and I strongly encourage you to plan on attending as many of these services as you are able.

So as we experience new birth and new life around us, it is my hope and prayer that you will find your faith strengthened, your hope renewed, and that you will be blessed with His peace and joy throughout the Easter season!

These activities represent a fraction of all the ministries that are occurring at St. George's. Treasurer's Report

For the months of January and February identified givers is down from last year by \$1,428. However due to new parking revenue from special event parking and rental of spaces during the week, we brought in \$4,371. This combined with wedding income put our total revenue at over \$48K, about \$4K more than last year.

Expenses are similar to last year with a slight increase to salaries and natural gas costs. Our Diocesan assessment is also lower this year. The main difference in expenses from last year to now is that we paid part of our insurance in February of 2022 and have not made a payment in the first two month of this year.
