Easter 2024: Christ Is Risen! Christ Is Risen Indeed!

This past week I have been trying to decide whether it's safe to switch my winter tires to all-season ones because I'm half expecting some terrible storm to head our way after such an incredibly gentle winter, and, as usual, I can't quite remember whether March came in like a lamb or like a lion.

But there's no denying the signs of spring and new life that are emerging all around us: the snows have melted, shoots are appearing in our flowerbeds, Canada geese are patrolling around the church, and yesterday I saw a guy dragging his lawnmower out of the garage. And while these signs of new life are emerging, we as the church are preparing to transition out of Lent to celebrate the new life and new hope that the Risen Christ brings.

You see, sometimes we as the church, particularly the North American church, think of the resurrection as an event that occurred in the past and is limited to the past. Now true enough, the resurrection of Jesus from the dead occurred in the past and is God's own testimony against death. But the resurrection of Jesus is also what empowers us for living. Because if we want to truly live, then we need to embrace what it means to live the resurrected life, a life full of love, meaning, and purpose. For the good news of Easter is not only that Jesus Christ has been raised from the dead and is alive, but also that the power of the resurrection can transform our lives as well.

Our Holy Week services begin on Palm Sunday, March 24th when we celebrate Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem with a procession of palm branches with services at 8:30 am and 10:30 am. Then on Maundy Thursday, March 28th, we'll gather at 7:00 pm to remember the Last Supper and Jesus' mandate (*mandatum* became *maundy*) to "love one another as I have loved you." After celebrating the Eucharist, our liturgy will include stripping the altar of all furnishings to remind us of how the soldiers stripped Christ of his garments prior to his crucifixion.

We then gather on Good Friday, March 29th, at 10:30 am to hear the proclamation of Christ's Passion and reflect upon his sacrifice for us. The tone is solemn, but not somber, for our emphasis is on the victory of the cross. We will then mark the beginning of the fifty days of Easter on Sunday, March 31st at 8:30 am and 10:30 am.

Holy Week provides an opportunity for us to encounter our most powerful and transformative liturgies. They are central to our faith and our walk with Christ, and I strongly encourage you to plan on attending as many of these services as you are able.

So as we experience new birth and new life around us, it is my hope and prayer that you will find your faith strengthened, your hope renewed, and that you will be blessed with His peace and joy throughout the Easter season!

Focusing on Liturgy with Children's Faith Formation

In the year and a half since the St. George's Church School reopened, we've seen a steady stream of new and returning children into our classroom. It's been a time of relearning how to "do Sunday School," but also a time of reflection on what we want children's faith formation in our parish to look like. In our first few months back, much of the focus of lessons was getting the children comfortable in the new space and routine. The various lockdowns, quarantines, and stay-at-home orders of the pandemic had meant that most of the children present had no personal understanding of what Church School was. After students felt more comfortable in the church, it was very quickly made apparent that lesson focus would need to be on teaching core biblical stories. Weekly lessons worked through the birth of Christ, his most prominent works, and the miracle of Easter.

As we entered our second year, lessons from the bible are still prominent in our curriculum, but we've had the chance to branch out more, and explore Christian faith in new ways through some lessons on liturgy. So far this school year, we've had two opportunities to do so. On the First Sunday of Advent, we had the exciting chance to make advent wreaths, with wooden frames and greenery provided by George Adams. Then, in mid-February, we traveled down to the Mitchell Hall kitchen to bake a batch of soft pretzels, a traditional Lenten treat. Both lessons were huge successes, with requests from children and parents to run the activities again next year.

While some may chalk up the buzz around these lessons to novelty of format or space, there is a certain wonder at being included in traditions and practices that date back generations. We, as Anglicans, mark our journey through the year with many feasts and seasons to helps us celebrate and understand more fully the entire mystery of Jesus Christ. We also use it to share in our Christian identity together. While making the Advent wreaths, parents who were helping spoke candidly with the children about their memories of wreaths when they were growing up. Children then shared their excitement about being able to lead their family's new tradition. While making Lenten pretzels, the children asked questions about fasting, and why Christians do it. One child mentioned how her Muslim friend from school would fast for Ramadan, and how she thought it was nice to be able to do something she felt was just as meaningful.

Children want to be a part of our faith; not just in Church School, but in all aspects of their spiritual life. By sharing the joy of liturgical practices with them as a part of their faith formation, we help them grow not just in mind and spirit, but in community with their church as well.

March 29 - Good Friday (10:30 am)


Good Friday will see a special lesson for children take place in our classroom for the duration of the service. Children will learn about the death of Jesus in a format that is both engaging and suitable for children.
